Faculty Position Available: Counseling

Position: Full-time Non-tenure-track faculty, Instructor, 3-year term, renewable

Start Date: Fall Quarter 2017 (9-month appointment with potential for summer teaching)

Description: The College of Education (COE) at Seattle University seeks applications for a three-year, non-tenure track full time counseling Instructor in the Department of Leadership and Professional Studies beginning in September 2017, with the possibility of renewal. This individual will teach and support the Counseling program and teach courses in both the school and clinical mental health counseling programs, with an emphasis on supporting the addictions counseling supplemental curriculum.

Responsibilities: Teaching and service. Teaching may include face-to-face, online or hybrid courses, course or curriculum design, and continuous improvement activities. Teaching will include content courses from the CACREP eight core areas and addictions counseling courses. Service will include advising and program level support. Other service activities may include service to the college and/or university, participation on professional advisory boards, developing relationships collaboratively with P-12 schools, clinical mental health agencies, chemical dependency treatment programs, and professional associations.

Ideal candidates must demonstrate an understanding of, commitment to, and ability to teach to Seattle University's Jesuit mission and the Counseling Programs social justice orientation.

Minimum Requirements: A master's degree in Counseling from a CACREP program. Coursework and experience as a chemical dependency professional. Minimum of two years experience as a counselor and college level teaching experience. Demonstrated commitment to multiculturalism, social justice, educating the whole person and preparing leaders for a just and humane world.

Preferred: A doctoral degree in Counselor Education from a CACREP program. Licensed as a Mental Health Counselor (LMHC) and/or Chemical Dependency Professional. Experience teaching and supervising at the graduate level and experience teaching online or hybrid courses.

Salary: The salary is commensurate with experience and qualifications.
